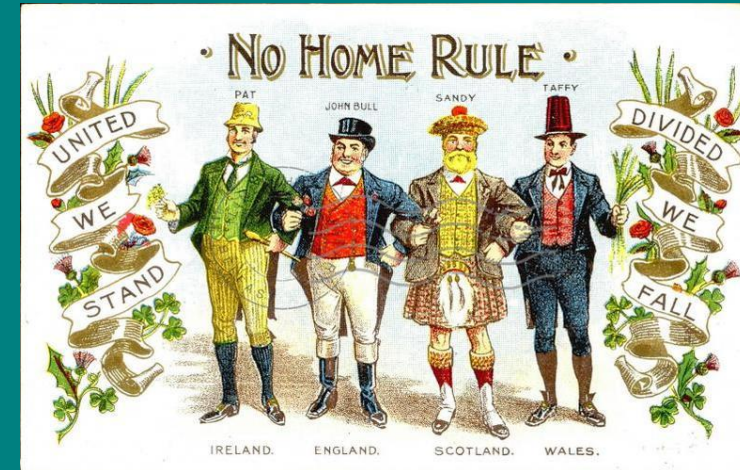

History at A level

Students will be following the AQA specification.

Unit 1G: Change and Transformation, Britain c1851 – 1964

- The changing fortunes of the Liberals, Labour and Conservative Parties in Britain in this period, including the role of Key individuals such as Gladstone, Disraeli and Churchill.
- The changing relationship between Britain and Ireland including the Easter Rising and the establishment of Home rule.
- The impact of the First and Second World War on Policy, including the emergence of communism and the BUF and the growth of the Welfare State.

Module Two:

Britain and Appeasement 1919- 1940

This includes international relations in the 1920s, challenges to international peace in the 1930s and the reasons behind appeasement.



2N Revolution and dictatorship: Russia, 1917–1953

This option provides for the study in depth of the coming and practice of communism in Russia. It explores concepts such as Marxism, communism, Leninism, and Stalinism, ideological control and dictatorship.

Part one: The Russian Revolution and the Rise of Stalin, 1917–1929

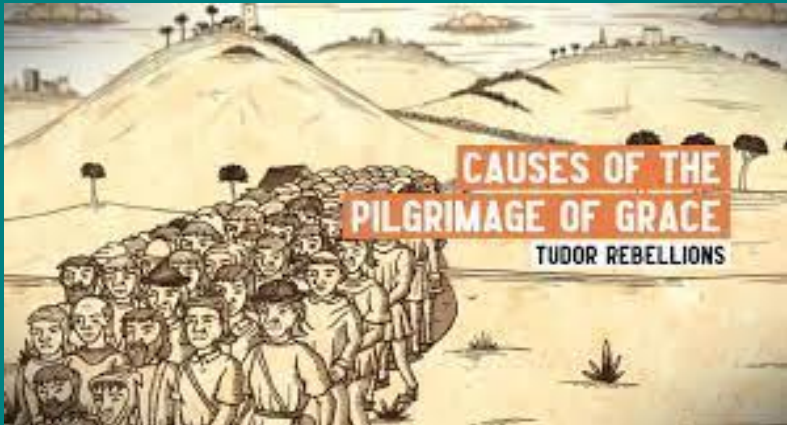

Unit Three : The Non Examined Assessment

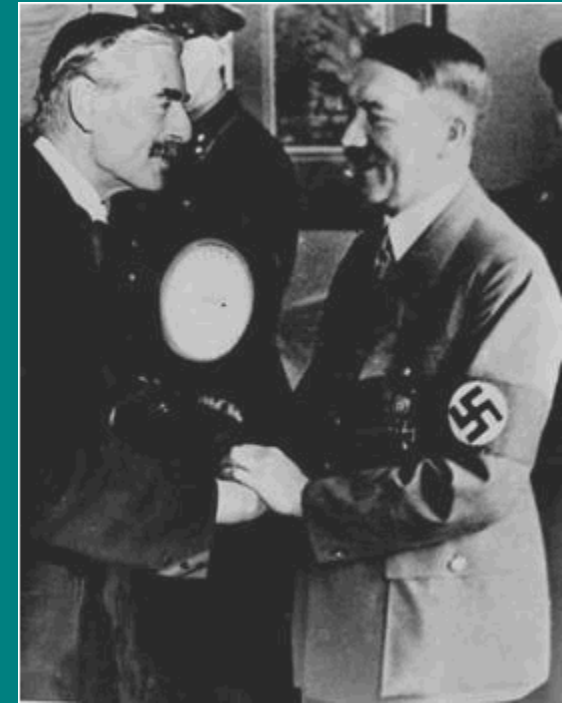
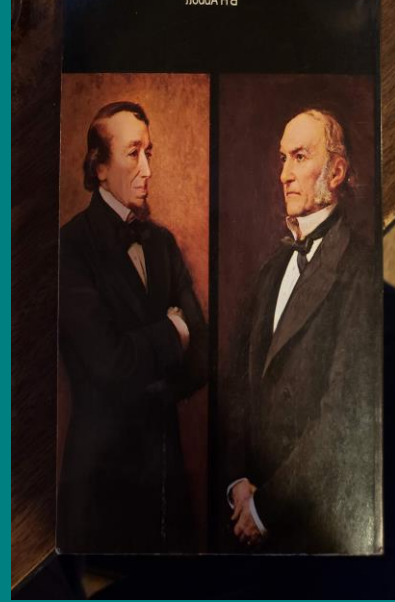
Coursework. This is a piece of work which is completed independently by the students on the Tudor Period.

This year students have been exploring the causes of rebellions against the Tudor Monarchs.



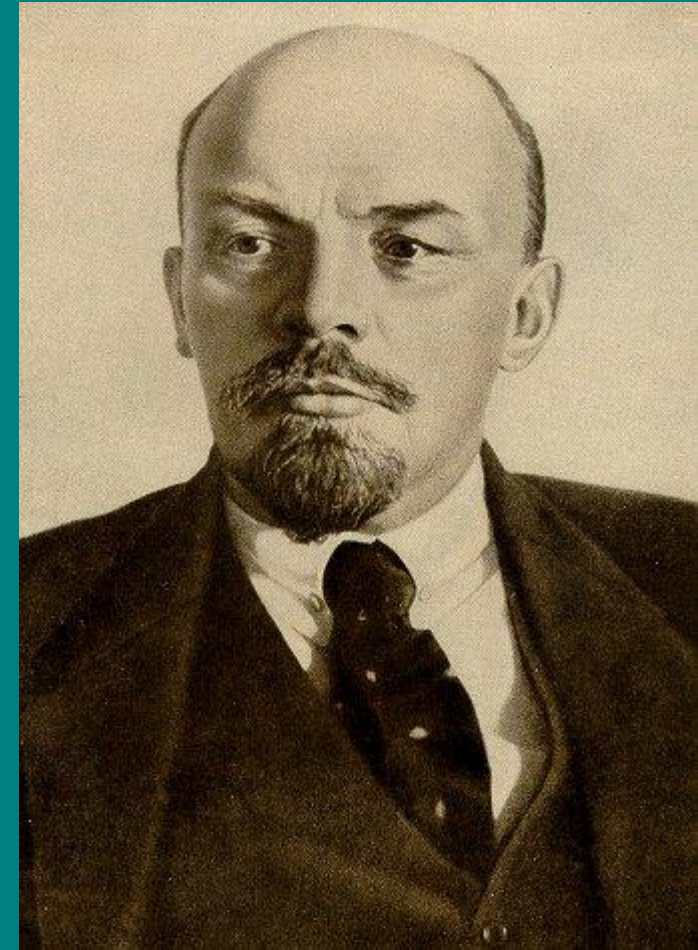
Why should I study History?
