### Day 3 Tuesday 28 May 2019

Breakfast	At 8.00am. Remember to collect your packed lunches.
Myrdalssandur	An area of 700km2 of sand flats created by volcanic eruptions and jokulhlaup (glacier burst). During some eruptions occurring under icecaps, large areas of ice can melt and the resulting outburst flood brings a rush of sediment and ice-laden floodwater.
Laufskálavarða	A former farm site demolished by a Katla eruption in 894. Superstition encourages passers-by to add to the cairn marking the site or to build another small cairn in the vicinity – judging by the number of cairns, Icelanders (and tourists) are clearly very superstitious! However, please remember that building cairns elsewhere on the island is not allowed, as it spoils the nature and disturbs rocks and vegetation.
Eldhraun	The 560km2 lava flow, believed to be the largest worldwide in historical times from a single eruption (Laki 1783), is covered in moss, in places 30cm deep. It is an interesting site to observe plant colonisation but please avoid treading on the moss
Fjarðarárgljúfur	An impressive canyon around 100m deep and 2km long, running through hyaloclastite (soft, granular rock) with lava intrusions. The entire formation dates back to the Ice Age 2 million years ago but was eroded by melt water as the glaciers retreated.
13:00 Boat Trip on Jokulsarlon Glacial Lagoon	A boat trip on the fascinating glacial lagoon is highly recommended. A trip amongst the icebergs is unforgetable and the photographic opportunities are endless. Join this excursion from in front of the cafe/little shop which is just beside the lagoon, just off of the ring road (Road 1). Life jackets are provided. Dress up warmly and don't forget your camera! Skaftafell	One of the more accessible sections of the 12,000km2 Vatnajökull National Park, Iceland's and Europe's largest protected area. Skaftafell is popular with hikers offering many scenic walking trails, among them routes to the glacier tongues of Skaftafellsjökull and Svínafellsjökull. At the Visitor Centre, learn about the park, its glaciers and many natural features. Café and toilets are available on site.
Kirkjugólf	Polished basalt columns, which are unusual in that they are viewed from above and resemble a 'Church Floor'.

#### Day 4 Wednesday 29 May 2019

Breakfast	At 8.00am. Remember to collect your packed lunches.
Important note for visits to beaches: Please ensure you keep well away from the sea. The local recommendation is at least 20 metres, but we suggest you err on the side of caution. Even when the sea appears to be calm, freak waves can occur with very little warning and potentially fatal consequences.	
Vik	At this tiny coastal town, walk down to the black sand beach and view the remarkable "Reynisdrangar" sea stacks. Whilst geologists talk of volcanic plugs, folklore tells a different version of how this spectacular natural monument was formed. Debris from the Katla eruption of 1918 extended Vík's coastline by 500m and you can see how the locals have responded to the threat of 'jokulhlaup' at different stages in the village's history. Just west of the town, observe the dyke built to protect the settlement from future flooding. Facilities include a souvenir shop, café and toilets.

h Is id n	The name means 'door hill island' – with its 120m high natural rock arch this prominent leadland is likely to have been formed in a submarine eruption similar to that of Surtsey sland in 1963. On a clear day, enjoy spectacular views of the volcano Eyjafjallajökull and cecap Mýrdalsjökull. The area is rich in birdlife with puffins, kittiwakes and guillemots lesting on the cliffs during the summer months. Note: this area has restricted access luring the nesting season.
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14:00 Hveragerdi Geothermal Centre	A collection of hot springs and solfataras in the town centre, where students and staff get the opportunity to taste eggs boiled in the hot springs and rye bread baked overnight in


## Day 5 Thursday 30 May 2019

Breakfast	At 8.00am. Remember to collect your packed lunches.
10:00 Secret Lagoon	The "Secret Lagoon" natural hot springs and bathing pool are located in the small village of Flúðir on the Golden Circle route. With the steam rising into the air, the place has a magical feeling. The water stays at 38-40 Celsius all year round and is perfect for bathing. In the area, you'll find several other geothermal springs, and a modest geyser, which erupts every 5 minutes, showing off for the guests relaxing in the lagoon! *Please note this is a natural pool and there are some large boulders under the water surface. Please advise your group not to climb on or try to jump off them as they can be slippery.  Remember your swimming costume and towel.  Tip: You may find it useful for half of your group to view the outside area while the other half use the changing rooms to avoid congestion.  Tel: (00354) 861 0237
Gullfoss	These double falls drop around 33m then plunge into a mile-long gorge – one of Iceland's most photographed waterfalls. Café, souvenir shop and toilets can be found here.
Geysir	Visit the site of Geysir, a spouting hot spring that gave its name to all the world's geysers Although it doesn't often spout nowadays, its neighbour 'Strokkur' erupts every 10-15 minutes reaching a height of around 30m. One of the trio of natural wonders on the Golden Circle route. Café, souvenir shop and toilets are available.
Efstidalur dairy farm - pay locally	Visit a working dairy farm where the barn has been converted into a restaurant, with windows into the cow shed, where you can watch the cows and calves in their daily environment. The farm makes its own milk products such as ice-cream, skyr, feta cheese and more. (Small home made soft ice from – ISK 400 or one scoop ISK 450, payable locally). Þingvellir (Thingvellir)	This National Park is where Iceland's parliament was established in 930AD. The site straddles the Mid-Atlantic Ridge, its rift valley forming where the Eurasian and North American tectonic plates pull apart at an average of 3cm a year. From the Hakið Visitor Centre enjoy an overview of the site and its geology. Then, walk among the rifts and see ropy pahoehoe lava from a shield volcano eruption, as you learn of the events that shaped Iceland's early history. As you gaze into the water-filled fissure Peningagjá, note how clear the water is, having been filtered through lava before it enters the lake. Facilities include café, Visitor Centre and toilets.
