Pupil Premium Statement for Academic Year 2020-21

Introduction

Pupil Premium was introduced by the government in April 2011. The funding was allocated specifically for children from low-income families who were eligible for free school meals, looked after children and those from families with parents in the Armed Forces.

Each individual school decides how their Pupil Premium is best spent to raise achievement and improve outcomes for the target pupils identified. Schools are however held accountable for how the funding is used and are expected to report to parents and the Governing Body on Pupil Premium expenditure.

It is our mission to develop Pupil Premium students into effective and independent learners so that they can use their talents to achieve the highest standards expected of all pupils at St Ambrose College.

2020/2021 Pupil Premium

For the financial year of April 2020 to March 2021 the college received £34,665 in Pupil Premium funding.

For the financial year of April 2021 to March 2021 the college has received £36,290 in Pupil Premium funding.

The COVID-19 pandemic had severe repercussions for in-school learning and therefore we had to adapt much of our 2020-2021 Pupil Premium Plan so that we could still provide effective interventions and support for our vulnerable students. Our adaptive measures included replacing one-to-one support meetings with weekly phone calls, reallocating trip funding to the provision of laptops and substituting FSMs with supermarket vouchers.
