REVIEW: THE HITCHIKER'S GUIDE TO THE GALAXY BY DOUGLAS ADAMS

Douglas Adams' "The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy" is a science fiction novel that explores the comedic adventures of a group of characters as they journey through space. 

THE MALEVOLENT PRESS WILL CONTINUE TO RAVAGE VULNERABLE YOUNG FOOTBALLERS

Athletes represent the peak of human potential but can also reflect human weakness. To perform consistently at the highest level of a sport requires an extraordinary mindset. LeBron James once said, "I think the mental side of the game is way over 50%, probably around 80%". An illusion surrounds professional sport that to reach the elite levels one merely requires skill, when in fact

a variety of factors can reduce a sportsperson ability to perform. From the outside, it may appear that athletes live the perfect life, living in luxury and given the opportunity to do what they truly enjoy. Whilst these are certainly major advantages, the difficulties that come alongside them are often looked past. Throughout this article, I intend to explore the ways in which living the life of a footballer can damage one's mental health.

Firstly, there is the press. Aggressive interviewers, rude questions and constant invasion of privacy are just a few of the struggles the media can inflict on a player. Prying eyes are ever waiting for footballers to appear in public view, almost waiting for them to do something even slightly imperfect, to capture it and plaster it around the world. The most famous example of a player crumbling under the spotlight is Paul Gascoigne, whose life and career serves as signposts in our own stories of hope and disappointment.

Like so many of today's young players, 'Gazza' wandered into the scene like a new-born lamb, only to be manipulated through an invasion of his personal life from the inside. The press scandal involved instructing reporters to ruthlessly hound every one of his steps, to follow his every move. Paul Gascoigne was treated in a way which violated his human

rights. The Human rights act of 1998, Article 8 states 'Everyone has the right to respect for his private and family life, his home and his correspondence'. The treatment of Paul Gascoigne clearly breaks this. Privacy is essential to who we are as human beings and protecting privacy is key to ensuring human dignity, safety and self-determination. Given the importance of these values in professional sport, the media is a significant problem.

However, examples of the traditional media causing such problems in the modern game are few and far between. Instead, social media stands as a platform for footballers to be relentlessly abused. A study found that 7 out of 10 Premier League players face abuse on Twitter alone, simply because of their profession. Furthermore, a report published by the media regulator Ofcom and The Alan Tu-

ring Institute found that of the 2.3 million tweets sent during the first half of the 2021-2022 season, more than 60,000 were abusive, exposing the tendency of a football fan to hate from the safety of their computer screen. This can have a detrimental effect on a player's mental health, which is so important to maintain in professional sport. A horrific example of this occurred after Euro 2020. After each

missing a penalty to hand the trophy to Italy, Marcus Rashford, Jadon Sancho and Bukayo Saka received floods of hateful comments, including racial slurs and emojis. Racism is never acceptable, in any circumstance, and alongside missing a crucial penalty, the players would have been left devastated by the experience.



The story of Marcus Rashford's last few seasons highlights the impact of mental struggles on a player. Rashford was a young player blessed with talent, bursting onto the scene at the age of 18. The start of his career went tremendously, as everything went his way. However, in the 19/20

season, a series of injuries began. During the season, Rashford was out for 149 days, with the following season also plagued with injury. When he returned to action, he simply wasn't the same player. He opened up to Sky Sports in a recent interview, saying "Too often last season, I wasn't in the right headspace for games. I wasn't surprised by some of

the stuff that was happening." Rashford had been swept by a wave of criticism, and his performances didn't hide it. Throughout the 2021/22 season, Rashford accumulated just 4 Premier League goals in 25 appearances, his career low.

However, this season, Marcus Rashford has inspired millions through his return to form, tallying 26 goals in the campaign. As reported by the Daily Mail, Rashford pinpoints a "completely different energy around the club and training ground", further commenting, "that puts me in a better headspace, and I feel really motivated. I

struggled mentally and with things off the pitch. That's the biggest difference,". This transparently shows the difference in a player's ability to perform when in a good headspace compared to a bad. In a profession where consistency is key, this is a problem which needs to be tackled promptly.

Society needs to wake up to the ugly truth about the supposedly beautiful game. Even today, footballers have less access to psychological support than a member of the public. Despite being in a position of extreme pressure, players often bottle up their emotions in fear of judgement from the press. Occasionally, this ends in tragedy. A young man takes his own life, highlighting the toxicity of the environment in professional football. How far can this problem go before any sign of response?




