O God of the Last Supper, God of the Cross, and God of the Empty Tomb; we come before you now and we pause.


We inhale the scent of snow white Easter lilies. We see the rain as it falls in veils and sheets of April showers. And we listen.


Most of all, show us how to linger at the table, serving others, doing all that we do in remembrance of You and the way You were when You walked this earth.

Before Easter every Form was invited to sign a letter pleading for pro bono legal help for Mahamadou's case. We are proud to stand up for the rights of people whose voice is not being heard . . .

To whom it may concern

We are a team of concerned students from St Ambrose College focused on Human Rights and Justice, and we are connected through to the Edmund Rice Network. This comprises a family of schools, ministries and social justice organisations which stretch across the UK and in 27 countries across the world. We have links to Edmund Rice International, a human rights NGO with consultative status at the United Nations in Geneva.

Our UK network is currently involved with helping a desperate asylum seeker from Niger, Mahamadou Souleymane, who has been repeatedly refused protection in the UK. His brother, who had British citizenship, was brutally and unlawfully murdered in Niger by a corrupt Nigerian politician and his henchmen to forcefully seize land belonging to the family. Mahamadou fled to the UK to escape the same fate. If he is refouled to Niger, he will be in absolute mortal danger. A 'culture of impunity' operates there and there is no protection by the Niger state against the violence of such seemingly untouchable men.

We know that Mahamadou's is just one desperate case among thousands of others, but we believe it to be illustrative of dire systemic faults in the UK asylum decision-making process. These were accurately identified in the Freedom from Torture report 'LESSONS NOT LEARNED - The Failures of Asylum Decision-Making in the UK', which summarised 50 reports from 17 different organisations. In Mahamadou's case, as an example, we identify:

- the lasting domino effect of initial (and unreasonable) adverse credibility findings.
- unrealistic and possibly unlawful evidential expectations (expecting legally verified 'detail' in evidence from a poor, isolated, rural village in the Sahel).
- excessive burden of proof.
- the use of initial negative judicial findings to block full and anxious evaluation of subsequent fresh evidence.

Mahamadou's latest refusal has all the hallmarks of a copy and paste job: the British Home Office have marked Mahamadou's case with a label generated through stereotype and apathy. They have completely disregarded this case as the plight of a desperate human being, but rather treated it with the generic contempt characteristic of a failing and weak immigration system.

Decisions, as Colin Yeo puts it in his guide to Refugee Law, seem to be based on the model of an idealised refugee who 'would finely judge the level of risk and attempt to relocate within their own country before departing, would claim asylum at the first opportunity in the first safe country reached and stay there, remember exactly what happened to them and when, be able and willing immediately on arrival to describe events chronologically and in detail'. Do we really expect someone fleeing from a village on the edge of the Sahara, who on arrival had not a word of English, to provide the legally verified 'details' a judge in Manchester might look for in domestically fully

evidenced cases? Decision-making can become an exercise in 'cultural dissonance': as Lord Russell once so wisely stated, 'a way by which the interviewer is able to express his ignorance of the world'.

Last month Mahamadou's fresh claim was carelessly rejected even though it contained a full report on the murder, Mahamadou's flight, and the intimidation of the village sent to our network by ANDOH, the Nigerian Association for the Defence of Human Rights (ANDOH). He is waiting for a First Tier Tribunal appeal hearing but legal aid solicitors, and even refugee charities like GMIAU, are unwilling to take on cases where previous fresh claims and appeals have been lost. Thus, with extremely limited English he will face brutal and confusing cross-questioning without representation.

We know that leading Immigration Chambers commit to a certain amount of pro bono work each year. We are seeking top-level engagement in Mahamadou's case both for Mahamadou's sake and to spotlight and challenge the underlying problems in the refusal culture: something we believe resonated with us and our students, but also something we believe you can offer. While there may be whole categories of refugees (e.g. from Afghanistan, Sudan, Eritrea) who in most cases have (until current legislation) been waved through, there are also genuine refugees fleeing from death or serious harm who face an impenetrable wall of refusal.

We plan to take this case and the general problem to M.P.s, the national press, and the UN Human Rights Council.

With limited English proficiency and facing cross-questioning without representation, Mahamadou's access to justice hangs by a thread. We believe that top-level engagement is essential not only for his sake but also to shed light on the pervasive issues within the refusal culture. While certain refugee categories may receive leniency, genuine cases like Mahamadou's encounter insurmountable obstacles.

We are determined to elevate Mahamadou's case and the broader issue to the attention of MPs, national media, and the UN Human Rights Council. Recognizing your commendable pro bono initiatives, we humbly request your support in Mahamadou's legal battle. Could you consider taking on his case, either for the First Tier Tribunal appeal or subsequent judicial review, as part of your commitment to pro bono work? Your involvement could make a significant difference in Mahamadou's quest for justice and in challenging the systemic injustices he faces. Please find attached the signatures of our staff and students who are supportive of this quest for justice.

What a race it was turning out to be, with all 6 nations heavily stacked with some of Ambrose's best athletes in the sixth form.


Each and every person involved played a massive individual part for their teams and pushed limits to the maximum.

Are you a young carer?

A young carer is anyone who looks after a family member, friend or neighbour who needs help because of their illness, frailty, disability, mental health problem or an addiction.

This can have a massive impact on a young person achieving their own aspirations effecting their long term mental wellbeing.

A BBC poll estimated there are around 800,000 young carers age 11-15 in England.

In Trafford, the 2011 census identified approximately 3,500 young carers under the age of 17.

Due to their care role young carers can often feel very isolated and this can impact on education, maintaining friendships and self-esteem.

At Trafford Carers Centre we support young carers from age 5 through to their transition to adulthood, to get the right support at the right time, including through schools and other agencies.



How we can support you



Our aim is to support young carers to reduce the impact of the care role on their physical & mental wellbeing.

We provide a range of services for carers including:

- Carers assessment to identify support needs
- Carer helpline offering information, support and advice
- Weekly activity sessions
- School holiday activities and day-trips
- Workshops e.g. cookery, art and creative writing
- Weekly Zoom activity sessions
- School drop-in sessions
- Young carer ambassador scheme
- Benefits advice
- Quarterly newsletter
- Support to understand and use digital technology
- Volunteering opportunities
- Advocacy support
- 1-2-1 casework support
- Carers emergency card scheme

Young carer checklist

Carers from age 5 to 18 are known as young carers and often take on practical and/or emotional caring responsibilities that would normally be undertaken by an adult.

The tasks can vary according to the nature of the illness or disability, the level and frequency of need for care and the structure of the family as a whole.

As a young carer you may help with:

- Practical tasks such as cooking, housework and shopping
- Physical care, such as lifting, helping someone on the stairs or with physiotherapy
- Personal care, such as dressing, washing or helping with toileting needs
- Managing the family budget, collecting benefits and prescriptions
- Administering medication
- Looking after or 'parenting' younger siblings
- Emotional support
- Interpreting, due to a hearing or speech impairment or because English is not the family's first language
